Our commitment to helping students achieve entry into leading universities started in 1982 when Canning College led the way as one of the first international education providers in Australia. Since then, we have continued to expand a supportive learning environment that has guided thousands of international students towards their career goals.

In 2020, we faced a new challenge as borders were closed and people around the world adapted to unusual

The health and wellbeing of our students was our immediate priority and our staff implemented measures to ensure the young people with us on campus felt safe and supported. It was also critical that we were able to continue to deliver programs to those students who had enrolled with us but who were unable to travel to Perth.

As a result, our teaching staff created a new approach that allowed students overseas to join their on-campus classmates in daily lessons using web conferencing and other digital tools. A survey conducted in September 2020 revealed that 96% of online students were satisfied with the quality of learning materials and resources provided, confirming the success of our remote learning programs. By offering programs face-to-face and online, new students were able to continue their studies and ensure they would not have to delay university entry.

In the immediate future, Canning College will continue to offer programs to students on campus and online with a sincere hope that travel restrictions will be lifted soon and students will again be able to travel to Perth. We are proud of our remote learning programs but a genuine international education experience is made complete by living and learning here in Perth.

Over the years, Canning graduates have been widely recognised for their academic achievements at leading universities and many alumni hold highly regarded positions across various industries. We expect this record of success to continue into the future as a result of our ongoing commitment to quality teaching, pastoral care, academic guidance and support services, which result in rich and rewarding student experiences. The College is frequently visited by past students, many of whom choose to send their own children to Canning so that they too can benefit from a vibrant international education experience. I know that the events of 2020 resulted in a more cautious approach to many things but believe the period of reflection has served us all well.

Now is the time to return to international education ambitions and to reach for the goals that may have been put on hold.

I encourage you to find your future with us at Canning College.

Perth, the capital city of Western Australia, is a modern western-style city of about 2.2 million people. The multicultural population enjoys an extensive range of high quality facilities and a relaxed cosmopolitan lifestyle. Perth's friendly people welcome visitors and students from all over the world.

Perth's wide open spaces and pleasant Mediterranean climate (warm/dry summers and cool/wet winters) create an excellent living environment where the air is clean and traffic flows freely across the metropolitan area.

Perth is connected to major cities across the world through its proximity to south-east Asian cities including Singapore, Hong Kong, Jakarta and Kuala Lumpur. It is situated in the +8-time zone, which makes it easy for communications between Asian students and family and friends at home.

Western Australia's dynamic economy was responsible for 36.5% of Australia's export products in 2018-19 and provides many career and business opportunities. Perth offers students quality accommodation at reasonable cost and rent is cheaper than many other cities in Australia. Quality food and other products from around Australia and overseas are available from Perth's many shopping facilities.

Living in Perth

The relaxed Perth lifestyle is well supported by excellent health care facilities and a clean, safe environment, as well as a stable political system. Perth has four seasons – spring (September to November), summer (December to February), autumn (March to May) and winter (June to August). Maximum temperatures average around 8-19°C in winter and 18-32°C in summer. Students are advised to bring lightweight clothing to remain cool during the warm summer weather and appropriate warm clothing for winter. The climate supports an active outdoor lifestyle.

Cost of Living

Perth traditionally has one of the lowest costs of living of any Australian capital city. The Australian Government provides information and guidance on managing your finances. You can read more at moneysmart.gov.au and studyinaustralia. gov.au

The average international student spends about AUD\$450-500 a week on accommodation, clothing, food, transport, entertainment, telephone and incidental costs. Airfares and tuition fees do not form part of this estimated cost of living.

It also does not cover additional costs associated with a more expensive lifestyle e.g. owning a car.

Part-time work is a great way to develop language skills, experience Australian culture away from campus and earn some pocket-money. Hourly rates vary (\$16-\$35 per hour) depending on the job and student's age. Students can work a maximum of 40 hours per fortnight during term time but can work full time during vacation periods. As study is the focus for students at Canning, recommended working hours are 8 to 15 hours per week – depending on course requirements. Earning income requires a student to have a Tax File Number (TFN). Students apply through the Australian Taxation Office.

Transport

Canning College offers an extensive range of quality student support services, all of which are included in the course fee. There are no additional charges for Canning College services.

As the college campus is located adjacent to Curtin University, Canning students can also enjoy some of Curtin's services. These include a medical centre, stadium, library, cafes, bookshop, a free hail and ride bus service around Curtin and Canning and Curtin Bus Station.

Airport Meeting Service

The College realises that it can be difficult arriving in a new country for the first time, so international students can arrange to be met by a College representative on arrival at Perth International Airport. They will be transported to their accommodation free of charge on their initial arrival to Perth. This service also includes students with homestay arrangements through Australian Homestay Network (AHN). Arrangements for airport pick up and accommodation will need to be made through the College's Student Services prior to student arrival in Perth.

Orientation

All new students are required to attend the compulsory Orientation program which provides them with crucial information and advice that will assist them in adjusting to the living and learning environment of the College and Perth. Students also receive help in selecting subjects, opening bank accounts, registering medical insurance, obtaining student/concession cards and finding permanent accommodation

The Orientation is also a good opportunity to meet fellow students and the staff at Canning College. The costs for being met at the airport (on initial arrival to Perth), all transport and meals during the Orientation program are covered by the College

Learning Support

In addition to formal classes, Canning College provides opportunities for additional assistance through optional tutorials or individual assistance. There is no additional charge for this service.

The Learning Centre, based in the Library, enables students to get individual or small group assistance from subject specialist teachers.

Canning also provides intervention support activities for students identified as 'at risk'.

Counselling

The College provides confidential counselling and advisory services to assist students with:

- · study skills
- · course information and subject selection
- · applications for tertiary study
- · career and vocational advice

A trained psychologist, is available by appointment to provide advice on personal issues. Student Services also has male and female advisors trained in assisting international students.





ACCOMMODATION

Accommodation is an important aspect of student life and Canning College aims to ensure that all students are comfortably and safely housed so they can focus on their studies. Accommodation services include:

- ensuring accommodation is easily accessible to the College
- · providing information on a variety of types
- and prices of accommodation

 placing each student in permanent accommodation during the Orientation
- advising on all aspects of accommodation in Perth
- · liaising with Australian Homestay Network as required

Accommodation Requirements for Students Under 18 Years of Age

The Department of Home Affairs requires students who are under the age of 18 years to have appropriate arrangements made for their welfare in Australia. Details are available on the Department of Home Affairs website.

Placement with Australian Homestay Network

For under 18 aged students requiring homestay, Canning College works with Australian Homestay Network (AHN) to arrange quality placements. Homestay provides students with a secure and family-like environment. Students are encouraged to join in with the family as it provides an excellent opportunity to practise English and learn about the Australian way of life. The family provides meals and assists with everyday needs such as laundry

and cleaning, allowing more time for study. More information is available on the AHN website: https://www.homestaynetwork.org/

Students can also stay with a direct family relative. This must be approved by the Department of Home Affairs using a **157N form**.

UniLodge at Curtin University -Vickery House

Vickery House, which has been managed by UniLodge since 2019, is situated on the eastern boundary of Canning College campus and houses over 300 Curtin University/Canning College students in 42 individual self-catering units, each housing 6-8 students of the same gender. The units are within easy walking distance of Canning College, shopping centres and public transport. Students have their own furnished single bed/study room and share the kitchen, living and washing areas. Students must be at least 18 years of age to take up residence. Resident parking is available free of charge.

Rental Properties - Houses, Units and **Apartments**

Students over 18 years of age who wish to have independent living arrangements can rent accommodation. Most students who choose this option will share with other students. Sharing arrangements may involve from two to eight people. There are numerous rental properties within close walking distance of the College, and the Accommodation Officer will provide students with help and advice regarding this type of accommodation.

TEACHING

Canning's teachers are highly qualified, experienced and dedicated to student success. All staff are registered with the Teacher Registration Board of Western Australia.

As Canning College focuses on preparing students for university studies, teaching styles include teacher directed and student centred activities. The aim is to ensure that all Canning graduates are independent learners and are capable of successfully engaging with university level learning. Students are encouraged to be active learners in all class activities. Teaching staff are available to students out of class time.

Online and Library resources are available in each subject and students are expected to carry out self-directed study activities.

Subject Selection

Final subject selection is completed during Orientation where students are provided with:

- General talk on careers and college pathways
- Information on specific university programs and study majors
- · Subject information from Heads of Learning Areas
- · Individual interview with an Advisor
- An individual timetable prior to commencement of classes

Subjects/units may be changed in consultation with an Advisor.

Learning Facilities

All classrooms have air-conditioning and are fitted with modern teaching resources such as multimedia projectors, smart boards, interactive screens and computers.

English is the language of instruction in all classes and students are encouraged to speak in English at all times to improve their English language skills.

Maximum Class Sizes

Diploma of Commerce:

Lectures – 50 students Seminars – 25 students Tutorials – 20 students

WAUFP, WACE, Year 11 and Year 10:

Academic subjects – 25 students English Language: 15 – 25 (depending on the English level).

Assessments

At the beginning of each program, students are issued with the assessment guide for each subject. Final marks can only be derived from publicised assessment activities.

Assessments are cumulative and continuous for the duration of each subject. Final results are expressed in percentage and/or grade form.



ONLINE LEARNING PROGRAMS

Online versions of Canning College's pathway-to-university programs were launched in July 2020 to assist overseas students who were unable to travel to Perth due to COVID-19 travel restrictions.

This innovative approach has allowed international students to start their studies with the College while remaining in their home country.

When travel restrictions are lifted, students who have started an online program will be required to travel to Perth and complete their studies on campus if conditions allow. This will allow students to receive a component of face-to-face tuition from our experienced educators and to fully experience life as an international student in Western Australia.

Learning Delivery

Students receive lessons and learning materials via **Connect**, a Learning Management System used by the WA Department of Education, and video

conferencing tool **Webex**. Lessons are delivered live and students are required to be online for each lesson. This ensures students feel connected to their teacher and fellow classmates.

Students are supported by a Care Group Leader, who will be the student's main point of contact.

Application Process

All students will be issued with a Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) after the school has received 50% of the course fees. In many cases, Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) will only commence when borders reopen and students are travelling into Australia to physically attend classes. However, students who package their Canning College program with a Western Australian tertiary institution may be required by the university to have OSHC in place during online studies with Canning.

Student visas are not required while students are studying offshore but can be lodged at any time at the discretion of education agents and students/parents.

Re-opening of Borders

Students will be expected to apply for their student visas and travel to Perth to continue their studies at Canning College once visas have been granted. They will then join students who are already participating in face-to-face classes at the College. If restrictions prevent students from entering Australia for the remainder of 2021, they will be required to complete the online component of the program in their home country.

The Year 10 curriculum provides a pathway into senior school. The curriculum focuses on literacy and numeracy and is designed to integrate the four major learning areas of Science, Technology, Engineering and Mathematics (STEM). The Year 10 program promotes creative, independent and critical thinking.

The successful completion of the WA Certificate of Education Year 11 program guarantees student entry into the WA Universities' Foundation Program, WA Certificate of Education Year 12 or Certificate IV in University Access Program.

The Year 11 program is structured around the compulsory subject Year 11 English as an Additional Language or Dialect (EAL/D). This subject is studied for nine hours each week for the duration of the program. Students must also study a Mathematics subject.

All students will develop their library and independent learning skills as part of Year 11 EAL/D. This is an important part of the program, giving an excellent introduction to research skills including internet, online databases and referencing.

YEAR 11 SUBJECTS

Students will study the compulsory subjects:

- · Year 11 English as an Additional Language or Dialect (9 hours per week)
- Mathematics Applications or Mathematics Methods (4.5 hours per week)

Students also select at least three subjects from the following Year 11 electives:

- · Accounting and Finance
- · Business Management & Enterprise
- · Chemistry
- · Computer Science
- Economics
- · Human Biology
- · Mathematics Specialist
- ·Physics
- · Psychology

All subjects are internally assessed. Students will receive a Statement of Progress after eight weeks and College reports at the end of each semester, which will indicate their progress and level of achievement.

WESTERN AUSTRALIAN CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATION (WACE) - YEAR 12

Although most international students find the WA Universities' Foundation Program to be the ideal pathway to university, for a variety of reasons, some choose to enrol in the Year 12 Western Australian Certificate of Education (WACE) program instead.

University entry is based on a student's Australian Tertiary Admission Rank (ATAR) which is a percentile ranking based on achievement in the WACE ATAR program.

The WACE is the program by which domestic Western Australian students qualify for entrance to tertiary institutions. It is similar to the WAUFP, but does not specifically address the needs of international students.

English as an Additional Language / Dialect (EAL/D) is normally available only to students whose first language is not English and who have not been resident in an English

speaking country for more than 7 years. Students must select at least one subject from List A & List B including English or EALD plus 4 or 5 other subjects.

On the satisfactory completion of Year 11 and Year 12, students are awarded a Western Australian Certificate of Education. Successful completion requires meeting OLNA standards.

Entry into Western Australian, Australian and overseas universities will depend on the ATAR achieved. Information about ATAR in Western Australia is available on the TISC website.

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BRIDGING PROGRAMS







BRIDGING PROGRAMS

CRICOS Course Code: 0930640

For students requiring academic and/or English language upgrading prior to entering an academic program, Canning College offers a range of Bridging Programs. This is an important component focusing on developing students' listening, speaking, reading and writing. Students select English and 4 other subjects. The content ranges from Year 10 to Year 11 levels and the emphasis is on preparing students for higher level programs.

Subjects selected vary according to the program and the student's individual needs.

Bridging programs range in length from one term to four terms (10 to 40 teaching weeks).

LINKING TO UNIVERSITY

Since the introduction of **Simplified Student** Visa Framework (SSVF) in July 2016, Canning has developed special packaged pathways with The University of Western Australia, Curtin University, Murdoch University and the University of Notre Dame Australia.

Canning pathways can be designed for the personal requirements of individual students and may include some or all of the following components: English Language Intensive Course for Overseas Students (ELICOS), Bridging, WAUFP, Certificate IV, Diploma of Commerce and a linked university undergraduate course.

The advantages of packaged pathways for students include:

- 1. Certainty of placement after completing a pre-university course.
- 2. Single visa for the entire study period.
- 3. Quicker and easier student visa application processes.

Full details of packaged pathway arrangements are available upon application. Universities may apply special conditions for SSVF packages. Students should be aware of university withdrawal/transfer/release policies.

Students successfully completing the WAUFP can access a range of undergraduate programs at institutions in Perth, namely Curtin University, the University of Western Australia, Murdoch University, Edith Cowan University and the University of Notre Dame Australia, as well as highly regarded programs at other Australian universities and some overseas institutions.



Universities

The University of Western Australia, Curtin University, Murdoch University, Edith Cowan University, University of Notre Dame Australia plus other Australian and overseas universities.



The guaranteed entry into a university course depends on the student meeting the particular requirements:

- 1. A pass in ELACS (50% or higher)
- 2. Achieve the required Combined Percentage Score (CPS) set by the university.
- 3. Complete pre-requisite courses set by the university.

Assessments

School assessments account for 50% of the final score. The final school mark/ grade for each unit is based on continuous and cumulative assessments. Assessment activities approved by the Tertiary Institutions Service Centre (TISC) include tests, internal examinations, laboratory reports, essays, assignments, projects and oral presentations. The other 50% is from external exams set by TISC. Final results are issued by TISC and university offers of place are issued by mid-December each year.

Each student receives progress reports, statement of final College results and a WAUFP results statement. Keeping track of academic progress is made easy as students can access marks online.

The calculation of the Combined Percentage Score (CPS)

The CPS can be calculated in two ways:

- The average of the best three scaled scores (excluding ELACS) OR
- The average of the best four scaled scores (including ELACS)

TISC will use the calculation which provides the highest result for each student.

Intakes

January Entry WAUFP – the standard program where students receive 9 hours per week of tuition in ELACS and 4.5 hours per week in other subjects. This program is suitable for all students who meet minimum entry requirements.

April Entry WAUFP – is an accelerated course. Students do extra hours each week, have fewer vacation weeks and sit the final examinations with January Entry students in November.

Mid-Year Entry WAUFP – is a standard Foundation program linked to mid-year entry at university. The program is a full academic year. Classes commence in July/August and students sit the final examinations in May of the following year.

Recognition

The Certificate IV in University Access Program is a one semester pre-diploma program and an accelerated university entry program. It provides ideal preparation for further studies at diploma or first year university level. It is the equivalent of Year 12 and is a Level Four Course on the Australian Qualifications Framework.

Successful completion will provide a pathway to the Diploma of Commerce at Canning College. The qualification also gives students the equivalent of a 70 ATAR (Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank) which can lead to entry into a selection of degrees at Curtin University and Murdoch University. Students who set exceptional standards in completing the Certificate IV in UAP can also gain entry into some degree programs at Murdoch University with an ATAR 80 entry requirement. The Certificate IV in UAP is offered as a commerce stream but could allow access to other degree courses subject to successful completion of entry requirements.

Credit for Recognition of Prior Learning

Canning College recognises prior learning by acknowledging competencies and outcomes achieved (skills, knowledge and attributes) as a result of formal training and education (both within Australia and overseas), work experience and/or life experience. Students who have successfully completed similar units of study at another institution may be given credit/an exemption for a module in the Certificate IV program.

Articulation

Successful completion of the Certificate IV program provides a guaranteed place in either stream of Canning's Diploma of Commerce

Successful students can also apply for first year undergraduate entry to a range of degrees at Curtin University and Murdoch University. In addition to completing the Certificate IV, students will also need to meet each university's undergraduate English requirement. Successful completion of Academic Communication, Parts A and B, meets the English language entry requirements for most undergraduate

degrees at Curtin University and Murdoch University. Some degrees, such as Nursing require a separate IELTS score. Students wanting admission to The University of Western Australia must do so through completion of Canning's Diploma of Commerce UWA Stream.

Program Structure

The program is two 10-week terms and entry is available in January, April, July and October each year. There is usually a 2-week vacation period between each 10-week tuition period.

Upon joining the program every student will undertake a separate Study Skills program of one hour per week for 10 weeks and learning assistance is available in subject support classes.

Assessment

Each unit has a course outline and assessment structure. Every student is given this information on commencement. Final results are determined by performance in all assessment activities. Competency Based Assessment is the process of collecting evidence and making judgements as to whether a competency has been achieved.

Assessment in each unit is continuous and includes a semester examination. Most units will be assessed through a combination of written examinations and coursework. Coursework may include group-based assignments, research assignments, presentations, laboratory and practical work. Every student who successfully completes the course receives a Record of Results and successful students receive the Certificate IV in UAP award at the annual graduation ceremony. Students who achieve partial completion of the Certificate IV in UAP will be issued with a Statement of Attainment.

Scholarships

Canning College offers a number of academic awards based on the applicant's results from their home country

Scholarships currently valued at AUD\$3,000 each can be awarded to top students commencing the Certificate IV program. Award offers are made in conjunction with standard offers. For more information, contact Student Services.

High achievers in the Certificate IV in UAP may also be eligible for a scholarship, if progressing into a Diploma of Commerce program at Canning.

Book Hire Scheme

To reduce costs for students, Canning offers Certificate IV students a book hire scheme. Rather than purchase texts, students pay a deposit of AUD\$300 and receive a refund of AUD\$175 on course completion. Details are in the annual booklist.





Accreditation

Canning College is a Registered Training Organisation (RTO) with the Training Accreditation Council in Western Australia. The Diploma of Commerce UWA Stream and Diploma of Commerce Curtin Stream are accredited courses through the Australian Skills Quality Authority (ASQA). The two diplomas are Level 5 qualifications within the Australian Qualifications Framework (AQF) www.aqf.edu.au

Articulation

The University of Western Australia, Curtin University, Murdoch University and the University of Notre Dame Australia guarantee entry into the second year of relevant bachelor courses for international students upon the successful completion of the Diploma of Commerce, which satisfies the university's requirements.

Canning College Entry Scholarships

Each year \$5,000 scholarships are offered by Canning College for students enrolling into the Diploma course. Awards are based on academic merit as demonstrated by the applicants' performance in entry programs studied overseas or within Australia.

Two Streams

Students are offered the choice of two courses in the Diploma Program:

- The Diploma of Commerce UWA Stream: 52751WA CRICOS Course Code: 0101827
- The Diploma of Commerce Curtin Stream: 52750WA CRICOS Course Code: 0101826

The Diploma courses are equivalent to first year university in terms of their course content and academic structure. Units are

studied over two semesters, with annual intakes in February and July. Successful completion of the Diploma guarantees international students entry into the second year of Bachelor of Commerce at The University of Western Australia, Curtin University, Murdoch University and the University of Notre Dame Australia. Completion of the Diploma may also lead to second year at other universities, subject to a university's individual assessment.

Credit for Recognition of Prior Learning

Canning College recognises prior learning by acknowledging competencies and outcomes achieved (skills, knowledge and attributes) held as a result of formal training and education (both within Australia and overseas), work experience and/or life experience. Students who have successfully completed similar units of study at another institution may be given credit/an exemption for a module in the Diploma of Commerce.

Small Class Sizes

There are real advantages in being part of a small and select program. The small class sizes ensure that students receive attention from the highly skilled lecturers, who get to know the students better. Being part of a small group allows students to feel comfortable asking questions and to be confident with their peers.

Additional Support

A mentoring program commences during orientation and extends into first semester. Staff are always available on an informal basis to help with learning strategies such as organising a study timetable, research skills and examination techniques.

Semester Organisation

The Diploma of Commerce is offered over two semesters. This closely follows university academic calendars. The study program includes at least one week free from class in mid-semester and a study week just prior to final exams. These breaks allow students to be fully prepared for assignments, tests and examinations. College staff consider the two-semester structure to be the most educationally sound way of delivering course material to ensure maximum success.

Lectures

Lectures provide students with the structure and content of a unit. Students are expected to make their own notes summarising the key points covered in the lectures and read in greater depth.

Tutorials and Seminars

Tutorials and seminars usually involve a small group of students and a member of the teaching staff. They provide an opportunity for further consideration of topics and questions regarding any complicated issues that have been covered in lectures. The major feature of tutorials and seminars is that students are encouraged to participate actively and positively during discussions through individual and/or group presentations. These active learning activities help prepare students for university-style learning and workplace tasks.

Laboratory Work

Computer based laboratory work forms another essential part of teaching learning strategies and is employed widely in Business Information Systems and Business Statistics. It gives students the opportunity to apply their knowledge and develop practical skills - useful for higher level learning and work place tasks.

Private Study

Students are expected to do private study on a regular basis to support their lectures and seminars. All resources are provided and easily accessible at Canning College. Students studying online can access resources on the Connect Learning Management System and Canning College's online library. The library caters for university level students. Private study contributes to the development of time management skills and the ability to work unsupervised – both highly valued in a work place.

ASSESSMENTS

Guardians are required to remain with the student for the relevant study period. Students cannot be left unsupervised by the visa holder unless appropriate care arrangements, approved by the College, are put in place.

In applying for a student visa, applicants must show they are coming to Australia temporarily to gain a quality education. Students must meet Genuine Temporary Entrant (GTE) requirements.

GENERAL INFORMATION

Deferment

Any student wishing to defer enrolment to a later semester must apply to Canning College in writing. Circumstances where deferment will be considered include education matters, medical issues, personal and family matters. If the deferment is approved, Canning will hold and transfer all fees to the new semester without any penalty. Deferment can be for a maximum of two semesters. If the student subsequently withdraws from the course, the Refund Policy will be applied from the date Canning College was advised of the withdrawal.

The Department of Home Affairs will be informed accordingly.

Leave of Absence

Any student wanting to take a leave of absence must apply in writing to Canning College. If leave is approved, there is no financial penalty, to a maximum of two weeks. After two weeks, deferment arrangements will apply. If a student applying for special leave is under 18 years of age, then, the application must be supported, in writing, by the student's parent(s) or legal guardian. If an under 18 aged student wishes to travel outside of Perth, approval must be sought from the College and arrangements supported by the parent (s) or legal guardian. Department of Home Affairs will be informed accordingly.

Urgent Medical Treatment

In circumstances where the student requires urgent medical attention and it is not possible to contact a parent/custodian/local carer, Canning College is authorised to arrange appropriate medical care.

Regulatory Framework

As a government international school, Canning College operates within a diverse regulatory framework, including the Schools' Education Act 1999 and the Education Services for Overseas Students (ESOS) Act 2000 and associated National Code. Information regarding the ESOS Act and National Code is available on the Department of Education, Skills and Employment website.

Transfer Policy

In accordance with government regulations, including the **National Code Standard 7** (Overseas student transfers), Canning College expects students to complete the program in which they are enrolled. This includes the completion of Simplified Student Visa Framework (SSVF) arrangements.

However, the College recognises that there may be educational or exceptional personal circumstances which require students to change provider. In such cases, applications to transfer and receive a letter of release will be considered on a case by case basis. Students are required to submit a copy of any offer from another provider and submit a written application for release.

Canning College will support students' education and personal interests, and a letter of release will be issued on such grounds. For students on SSVF packages, release will be required from the university (the principal provider) with which the package (and visa) is linked. Be sure to check the policy of the relevant university.

Canning College will not enrol any students who are in breach of regulatory requirements relating to transfer between registered providers.

Further information regarding changing courses/providers is available on the Australian Government website. Further information regarding National Code Standard 7 (Overseas student transfers) is available on the Department of Education, Skills and Employment website.

Medical Insurance

Every international student is required to have medical insurance for the period of the student visa. This is a regulation imposed on every student by the Department of Home Affairs and is defined in **mandatory condition 8501**.

Medical insurance (Overseas Student Health Cover) is provided by Bupa and the current rate is AUD\$596 per 12-month period (subject to changes by Bupa). Prorated premiums apply to longer or shorter courses. Students with package visas must pay the premium which covers the entire visa/study period.

The OSHC helps pay for medical and hospital care that students may need whilst studying in Australia and will contribute towards the cost of most prescription medicines (up to applicable limits) as well as medically necessary ambulance transport. Further information regarding medical insurance is available on the Bupa website.

Suspension or Cancellation of Enrolment

Canning College has the right to suspend or cancel a student's enrolment or re-enrolment in response to any breaches of attendance, academic progress and / or behaviour requirements. Under the Education Services for Overseas Students (ESOS) Act 2000, Canning is required to report such instances to the Department of Home Affairs.

Any action is subject to internal and external (including Western Australian Ombudsman) appeal processes. Detailed information is issued in the acceptance documents. Canning College exclusion processes comply with WA Department of Education requirements.

Students who self-cancel enrolment/student visa should seek advice from Student Services and the Department of Home Affairs about other visa options.

Attendance

Canning College encourages all students to maximise attendance as it is a key to academic success.

Students are expected to maintain a satisfactory level of attendance and comply with Australian government requirements (attend at least 80% of scheduled classes).

The attendance rate is calculated by dividing the number of classes attended by the total number of scheduled classes (including examinations), expressed as a percentage. Students encountering problems with attendance may be placed in a student management program.

ENROLMENT PROCEDURES

CANNING COLLEGE DOES NOT CHARGE AN APPLICATION FEE.

Students can appoint an Education Agent to represent them in applying for a place at Canning College. A list of Education Agents is available on the Canning College website.

Education Agents

In accordance with industry requirements as defined in the ESOS Act, Canning College works only with registered agents. Applications for enrolment can be made through registered agents who can advise on courses, facilities, dates, fees and other aspects of study at Canning. Agents can also assist with the student visa application process.

As a Western Australian government provider, Canning College oversees the registration and ongoing management of our education agents.

Notification of such an arrangement must be submitted to Canning, in writing. Once an agent has arranged a student's program at Canning and enrolment is complete, the student may not appoint another agent until the initial program is completed. In exceptional circumstances, a student may nominate a replacement agent. Such circumstances include: inappropriate service from an agent, an agent ceasing to offer services, the agent losing registration.

Alternatively, students can apply directly to Canning College. Any student requiring assistance with the application process can contact Student Services.

Documents Required

All documents must be certified true copies and in English language.

- Certified copies of relevant academic records and English test results.
- Proof of age e.g. birth certificate, passport, national identification card
- Relevant work experience records and resume if applicable.

Payment of Fees

All fees are payable in Australian dollars. Fees may be paid to Canning College by:

- 1. Flywire (by peer transfer) canningcollege.flywire.com
- 2. Bank cheque
- Credit card (Visa and Master cards only)
 Please ensure that a copy of the transfer
 receipt is sent by email to Student
 Services and the student's full name
 appears on the transfer receipt.
- 4. EFTPOS debit cards are accepted for payments made directly at Student Services. (Students are advised not to carry large quantities of cash to pay fees and be aware of daily debit limits).

Failure to pay the required fee by the specified date may incur a AUD\$200 penalty - late payment fee.

On receipt of the fees, and all acceptance documents, Canning will issue an official receipt, the electronic Confirmation of Enrolment (eCoE) and other documents as required for the finalising of the student visa process. Other documents required include: Letter of Offer, proof of Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC), and care arrangements for under 18 aged students (if applicable). Students must comply with Genuine Temporary Entrant (GTE) requirements.

Canning College is unable to assist in the student visa process.

REFUND SCHEDULE

Conditions for Applying for a Refund

The following refunds apply:

- a) Student is denied a visa by the Australian Government. No written agreement applies: refund of all course fees less an administration fee of up to AUD\$500.
- b) Student withdraws or transfers more than 10 weeks before the program commences. Refund of all course fees paid less an administration fee of up to 10% or AUD\$1000.00, whichever is the lesser.
- c) Student withdraws or has enrolment arrangements cancelled due to not meeting English language requirements after undertaking linked ELICOS studies, refund of all course fees paid less an administration fee of up to 10% or AUD\$1000.00, whichever is the lesser.
- d) Student loses Good Standing status due to failure to comply with attendance, behaviour or subject work requirements (including meeting assignment deadlines, sitting for scheduled tests and examinations); all course fees for the current semester are forfeited and standard refund policy conditions are applied to any subsequent semesters, from the date of termination.
- e) Where a student has paid a deposit for a package principal course at Canning and withdraws after completing the preliminary course and prior to commencement of the principal course, the deposit will be refunded less an administration fee of up to 10%. If the student withdraws after the commencement date, the deposit is forfeited.
- f) Student withdraws or transfers:

- g) This agreement (policy) does not remove the right of the student or College to take further action under Australia's consumer protection laws or general legal processes.
- h) Any refund will be issued within seven working days of the student submitting all clearance documents. Refunds will be made according to instructions from the person who confirmed/accepted the student's enrolment and arranged for payment of fees.
- i) Applications for refunds must be in writing and addressed to the Director, International Operations.
- i) If the nominated course is unable to be provided by the College, then, fees paid will be refunded in full or alternative comparable placements arranged.

CONDITIONS OF APPLICATION/ENROLMENT

Students are required to read and understand the conditions of application and enrolment outlined below.

1: Tuition Fees

Tuition fees are are reviewed annually. Fees for the subsequent year will be published in the latest Canning College Prospectus. Additional tuition fee payments can be made at any time.

Tuition fees must be paid prior to the start of each semester. Fees and Overseas Student Health Cover (OSHC) are to be paid at least one month prior to the commencement date of the course. All payments are to be made in Australian dollars and payable to Canning College. The Confirmation of Enrolment (CoE) will then be issued and visa procedures may be completed. You must ensure payments are made in accordance with the regulations to ensure you maintain a valid enrolment.

Where programs are less than 20 weeks in length, the entire fee must be paid prior to enrolment being confirmed.

Where programs are more than 20 weeks in length, fee payment is to be made in two instalments related to two study periods. The first study period is the first semester of the academic program. The second study period is the second semester of the academic program. 50% of fees due (see fees payable on Letter of Offer) must be paid prior to the commencement of the first study period. The remaining 50% of fees must be paid two weeks prior to the commencement of the second study period.

Late payment of fees - A\$200 penalty fee may apply to any fees required two weeks after the due payment date.

2: Orientation

As a new student you are required to attend the Canning College orientation session which will provide you with important information regarding your studies including timetable, assistance available to you and information about life in Western Australia.

Information about your orientation will be emailed to you approximately four weeks before you are required to commence. Orientation information can also be obtained by contacting the college on Canning.Col.Admissions@education.wa.edu.au.

3: Accommodation

The College will assist students in finding suitable accommodation for the enrolment period. This service provided by Canning College is included in the program fee. On campus accommodation is available at UniLodge Vickery House for students over the age of 18. Otherwise students under 18 are required to use the services of Australian Homestay Network (AHN) unless staying with approved family.

4: Care and wellbeing of students aged under 18



5: Attendance of Excursion

The student may attend any excursion organised and approved by College staff as part of the orientation, teaching/learning or recreation programs. For students under 18 years of age, a permission form must be signed by the parent(s), guardian or carer.

6: Urgent medical care

In the event of circumstances requiring urgent medical care and it is not possible to contact the parent/guardian, the College is authorised to seek and provide appropriate medical treatment. Any important medical information is provided to the College.
